**SOUTHWESTERN ILLINOIS COLLEGE ANNUAL POLICY  
NOTIFICATION/DISTRIBUTION**

As a requirement of these regulations, Southwestern Illinois College (SWIC) is to disseminate and ensure receipt of the below policy/information to all students, staff, and faculty on an annual basis. This process is formally conducted by SWIC's Compliance Committee, through the coordination of Department of Public Safety, Human Resources, Academic Advising (Wellness Advocate) and Student Development. **Polices - Alcohol, Other Drugs, and Weapons**

As an academic community, Southwestern Illinois College is committed to providing an environment in which learning and scholarship can flourish. The possession or use of illegal drugs, or the abuse of those which may otherwise be legally possessed, seriously affects the College environment, as well as the individual potential of our students and staff. The College enforces state laws and related College policies, including those prohibiting the following activities on campus or other college owned or controlled property, within college vehicles, or other college affiliated activities:

- A. Alcohol: Providing alcoholic beverages to individuals under 21; or possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages by individuals under 21; or possession/consumption of alcoholic beverages not in compliance with Board Policy 7015
- B. Drugs: Manufacturing, growth, possession, distribution, use of illegal drugs or controlled substances, to include synthetic drugs/substances and possession or use of medical marijuana. Medical marijuana may not be possessed or used on college property or in any college vehicle. The use of medical cannabis is prohibited by a Public Safety Officer (Commissioned or Non-Commissioned) and by ATS drivers.
- C. Weapons: Manufacturing, sale or possession of firearms or deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; illegal aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

## Definitions:

- A. An illegal drug is defined for the purposes of this policy as any drug that is either not legally obtainable or has not been legally obtained. The term includes prescribed drugs not legally obtained, prescribed drugs not being used for prescribed purposes, prescribed drugs being used by a person other than the prescription holder, and marijuana.
- B. Legally prescribed medications are not covered under this policy and are permitted to the extent that their use does not adversely affect the employee, student, or enrollee's work ability, job performance, or the safety of others in the workplace/educational setting. The policy does not apply if the drug is prescribed or authorized by a medical practitioner while acting in the course of her/his professional practice (except for medical marijuana) and such drug is used by the individual at the prescribed or authorized dosage level, and such level is consistent with the safety of the college/campus operations or college related activities.

**Students:** The abuse of alcohol and other drugs by students, regardless of age and location (on-campus or off-campus at college owned or controlled property affiliated with a college activity), is prohibited by the Student Conduct Code. The College can, and will, impose disciplinary sanctions for violations. Students also are subject to city ordinances and state and federal laws.

**Employees:** The abuse of alcohol and other drugs by staff, which impacts the employees duties, regardless of location (on-campus or off-campus at college owned or controlled property affiliated with a college activity), is prohibited by Board Policy 7015. The College can, and will, impose disciplinary sanctions for violations in accordance with Board Policy and/or other collective bargaining or employee group agreements and administrative procedures. Employees also are subject to city ordinances and state and federal laws.

The College strongly encourages students and staff members to voluntarily obtain assistance for dependency or abuse problem before such behavior results in an arrest and/or disciplinary referral which might result in their separation or termination from the institution.

The use of, or addiction to, alcohol, marijuana, or controlled substances is not considered an excuse for violations of the Student Conduct Code or work place expectations, and will not be a mitigating factor in the application of appropriate disciplinary sanctions for such violations.

Help is available both on campus and within the community for students and staff members who are dependent on, or who abuse the use of alcohol or other drugs.

- The Academic Advising Center has alcohol and other drug information or visit [swic.edu/students/services/safety/public-safety/counseling-and-treatment](http://swic.edu/students/services/safety/public-safety/counseling-and-treatment). SWIC's Academic Advising Center also provides Wellness Advocates for confidential assistance to students, faculty and staff. If requested, staff will make referrals to professional treatment programs.

- The Human Resources Department can assist staff with using the employee's personal insurance or obtaining assistance from local support services.
- Off-Campus Agencies: Other professional agencies will maintain the confidentiality of persons seeking help for personal dependency and will not report them to institutional or state authorities. See On Campus/Off Campus Resources and Services below

The Academic Advising Department, through the Wellness Advocate, provides educational and awareness programming, information, and assistance.

### **Tobacco-Free Campuses**

As of July 1, 2015, SWIC is a tobacco free campus. Smoking and the use of tobacco products – to include smokeless, e-cigarettes or other devices that simulate visual, sensory and behavioral aspects of smoking – in all college-owned, rented or leased properties and vehicles is prohibited, except in your personal vehicle while parked on college property. ### **Drug Testing:**

In order to provide a safe learning environment and work place free from drug and alcohol abuse, Southwestern Illinois College has adopted and will continue to implement a drug and alcohol testing program.

1. The college is required to establish a drug and alcohol abuse testing program for specific safety sensitive personnel. This requirement results from the federal Omnibus Transportation Employees Act of 1991 (Public Law 102-143).
2. The college will consider the following safety sensitive personnel for the purpose of the Testing Program: ATS drivers and dispatchers, designated Physical Plant personnel, Athletic Department Coaches, and Public Safety Officers.
3. All Faculty and staff can be tested for cause in accordance with Board of Trustees policies, statues, employment contracts, or collective bargaining or employee group agreements.
4. Student-Athletes can be tested in accordance with the Athletic Departments, Substance Abuse Prevention Procedures.

Testing for illegal drugs shall be performed using a urine sample collected with a chain-of-custody and will include testing for the following substances: cocaine, marijuana, opiates, amphetamines, methamphetamines, and phencyclidines. All drug testing will include review by a qualified Medical Review Officer (MRO) and an "MRO Positive" result will be considered a positive result.

**Student Sanctions - Alcohol, Other Drugs, and Weapon.** The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of alcohol, drugs, controlled substance, or firearms or other dangerous weapons (reference Board Policy 7020/AP) by students on College premises, or while conducting College affiliated activities off College premises, is absolutely prohibited.

Underage students confronted by the institution for the consumption of alcohol will face disciplinary sanctions ranging from Disciplinary Reprimand - Probation - Social Probation - Suspension - Expulsion - Assessment for Restitution - Separations or Restrictions.

Students whose use of alcohol or drugs results in harm to others, or to property, regardless of the location of the incident if affiliated with college-sponsored activities, will face disciplinary action by the College up to and including expulsion.

Students confronted by the institution for the manufacturing, sale or possession of firearms or deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; illegal aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned will face disciplinary sanctions ranging from Disciplinary Reprimand - Probation - Social Probation - Suspension - Expulsion - Assessment for Restitution - Separations or Restrictions.

As members of the College community, students are also subject to city ordinances and to state and federal law. Arrest and prosecution for alleged violations of criminal law or city ordinances may result from the same incident for which the College imposes disciplinary sanctions, if the violation occurs on college owned or controlled property, or affiliated with a college-sponsored activity.

### **Employee Sanctions**

The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a alcohol, controlled substance, or firearms or other dangerous weapons (except as described in Board Policy 7015 and 7020/AP) by employees on College premises, or while conducting College business off College premises, is absolutely prohibited. Violations of this prohibition by employees may result in the application of sanctions, including possible required participation in an approved drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program, and disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment under applicable Board of Trustees regulations, College policies, statutes, employment contracts, or collective bargaining or employee group agreements.

### **Illinois Sanctions for Violation of Alcohol Control Statutes**

235 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/6-20

- A. Class A Misdemeanor - unlawful use of a identification card
- B. Class 4 Felony - fictitious or unlawfully altered identification card
- C. Class 4 Felony - fraudulent identification card
- D. Class B Misdemeanor to possess or sell alcohol if you are under 21.\*
- E. Class A Misdemeanor to sell, give, or deliver alcohol to individuals under 21 years of age. Local ordinances may also be enforced.

Class A Misdemeanors are punishable with a fine of \$1 to \$2,500 and up to 1 year in the county jail.

Class B Misdemeanors are punishable with a fine of \$1 to \$1,500 and up to 6 months in the county jail.\* These violations may also result in one's driver's license being administratively revoked or suspended by the Illinois Secretary of State's office.

## **Illinois Penalties for Drinking and Driving Under Age 21**

- A. Driving while under the influence of alcohol, other drug or drugs, intoxicating compound or compounds or any combination thereof
  - a. First Conviction
    - i. Minimum of two-year loss of full driving privileges
    - ii. Possible imprisonment for up to one year
    - iii. Maximum fine of \$2,500
  - b. Second Conviction
    - i. Minimum five-year loss of full driving privileges for a second conviction in a 20-year period
    - ii. Mandatory five days imprisonment or 240 hours of community service
    - iii. Possible imprisonment for up to one year
    - iv. Maximum fine of \$2,5000
  - c. Third Conviction – Class 2 Felony
    - i. Minimum ten-year loss of full driving privileges
    - ii. Mandatory 18-30 month periodic imprisonment
    - iii. Possible imprisonment for up to seven years
    - iv. Maximum fine of \$25,000
  - d. Aggravated DUI – Class 4 Felony (following a crash resulting in great bodily harm or permanent disfigurement)
    - i. Minimum of one-year loss of full driving privileges
    - ii. Possible imprisonment for up to twelve years

C. The Zero Tolerance Law provides that minors can have their driving privileges suspended even if they're not intoxicated at the .08 level. The following table shows the length of time your driving privileges may be suspended under the Zero Tolerance Law (for BAC of .01 or greater) and DUI Laws (for BAC of .08 or greater). The loss of driving privileges is greater if you refuse to take a sobriety test.

### Effect on Driving Record

- Zero tolerance (BAC of .01 or greater) – except during suspension period, not on public driving record as long as there is no subsequent suspension.
- DUI conviction (BAC of .08 or greater) – Permanently on public driving record

\*Under certain conditions, you may be charged with DUI even though your BAC is below .08.

Except during suspension period, violation is not on public driving record as long as there is no subsequent suspension permanently on public driving record.

This chart gives examples of the penalties which may be imposed on individuals convicted of drug possession, manufacturing, or delivery. *The circumstances of the case and other factors affect whether or not these are the actual penalties imposed.*

### **Marijuana Sale or Delivery (720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 550/5)**

Class B Misdemeanor: 2.5 grams or less, \$500 fine and/or six months in jail

Class A Misdemeanor: 2.5-10 grams or less, \$1,000 fine and/or one year in jail

Class 4 Felony: between 10-30 grams, 1-3 years in jail and/or \$10,000 fine

Class 3 Felony: between 30-500 grams, 2-5 years in jail and/or fine not to exceed \$50,000

Class 2 Felony: 500 or more grams, 3-7 years in jail and/or fine not to exceed \$100,000

## **Possession (720 Illinois compiled Statutes 550/4)-Effective August 2016**

Civil Law Violation: Not more than 10.0 grams - minimum fine of \$100 & a maximum fine of \$200;

Class B Misdemeanor: between 10-30 grams, not to exceed \$1,500 fine and/or six months in jail

Class A Misdemeanor: between 30-100 grams, not to exceed \$2,500 fine or amount specified in offense whichever is greater, and/or one year in jail; subsequent offense is a Class 4 Felony.

Class 4 Felony: between 100-500 grams, 1-3 years in jail and/or not to exceed \$25,000 fine or amount specified in offense whichever is greater; subsequent offense is a Class 3 Felony

Class 3 Felony: between 500-2,000 grams, 2-5 years in jail and/or fine not to exceed \$25,000 or amount specified in offense whichever is greater.

Class 2 Felony: between 2,000-5,000 grams, 3-7 years in jail and/or fine not to exceed \$25,000 or amount specified in offense whichever is greater.

Class 1 Felony: more than 5,000 grams, 4-15 years in jail and/or fine not to exceed \$25,000 or amount specified in offense whichever is greater.

## **Drug Paraphernalia Control Act – 720 ILCS 600/3.5(c): Effective August 2016**

IF Civil Law violation for cannabis, then any cannabis drug paraphernalia seized - Civil Law violation (minimum fine of \$100 & a maximum fine of \$200). Officers who seize drug paraphernalia with cannabis residue can write the civil law violation for this even if there is an insufficient amount to warrant the civil law violation for the cannabis possession.

## **Compassionate Use of Medical Marijuana Pilot Program Act (410 ILCS 130/65): Effective 2016**

Applicants for Medical Marijuana cards, who have prior felony convictions, may be eligible for a patient card if the conviction would no longer constitute a felony under the amended Cannabis Control Act. Officers may encounter subjects who have prior felony convictions and valid Medical Marijuana cards.

## **Federal Drug Laws**

The possession, use, or distribution of marijuana and illicit drugs, to include medical marijuana, is prohibited by federal law. Strict penalties are enforced for drug convictions, including mandatory prison terms for many offenses. The following information, although not complete, is an overview of federal penalties for first convictions. All penalties are doubled for any subsequent drug conviction. ## Denial of Federal Aid (20 USC 1091)

Under the Higher Education Act of 1998, students convicted under federal or state law for the sale or possession of drugs will have their federal financial aid eligibility suspended. This includes all federal grants, loans, federal work study programs, and more. Students convicted of drug possession will be ineligible for one year from the date of the conviction of the first offense, two years for the second offense, and indefinitely for the third offense. Students convicted of selling drugs will be ineligible for two years from the date of the first conviction, and indefinitely for the second offense. Those who lose eligibility can regain eligibility by successfully completing an approved drug rehabilitation program.

## Forfeiture of Personal Property and Real Estate

**21 USC 853:** Any person convicted of a federal drug offense punishable by more than one year in prison shall forfeit to the United States any personal or real property related to the violation, including houses, cars, and other personal belongings. A warrant of seizure is issued and property is seized at the time an individual is arrested on charges that may result in forfeiture.

**720 ILCS 36:** Article 36 is a statute in the Illinois Criminal Code, found at 720 ILCS 5/36-1. It reads as follows: Any vessel, vehicle or aircraft used with the knowledge and consent of the owner in the commission of, or in the attempt to commit an offense. For a list of all offenses that subject personal property to forfeiture, please see 720 ILCS 5/26. Statutes which authorize forfeitures in Illinois, include but not limited to:

- Controlled Substances Act (720 ILCS 570/505)
- Cannabis Control Act (720 ILCS 550/12)
- Methamphetamine Protection Act (720 ILCS 646/85)
- Legend Drug Act (410 ILCS 620/3.23)

## Federal Drug Trafficking Penalties (21 USC 841)

Penalties for federal drug trafficking convictions vary according to the quantity of the controlled substance involved in the transaction. The following list is a sample of the range and severity of federal penalties imposed for first convictions. Penalties for subsequent convictions are twice as severe.

If death or serious bodily injury result from the use of a controlled substance which has been illegally distributed, the person convicted on federal charges of distributing the substance faces mandatory life sentence and fines ranging up to \$8 million.

Persons convicted on federal charges of drug trafficking within 1,000 feet of a College (21 USC 845a) face penalties of prison terms and fines which are twice as high as the regular penalties for the offense, with a mandatory prison sentence of at least 1 year.

### **Federal Drug Possession Penalties (21 USC 844)**

Persons convicted on Federal charges of possessing any controlled substance face penalties of up to 1 year in prison and a mandatory fine of no less than \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$100,000. Second convictions are punishable by not less than 15 days but not more than 2 years in prison and a minimum fine of \$2,500. Subsequent convictions are punishable by not less than 90 days but not more than 3 years in prison and a minimum fine of \$5,000. Possession of drug paraphernalia is punishable by a minimum fine of \$750.

Special sentencing provisions for possession of crack cocaine impose a mandatory prison term of not less than 5 years but not more than 20 years and a fine up to \$250,000, or both if:

- A. It is a first conviction and the amount of crack possessed exceeds 5 grams;
- B. It is a second conviction and the amount of crack possessed exceeds 3 grams;
- C. It is a third or subsequent crack conviction and the amount exceeds 1 gram.

Civil penalties of up to \$10,000 may also be imposed for possession of small amounts of controlled substances, whether or not criminal prosecution is pursued.

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Individual, group and community educational programs and interventions designed to prevent and reduce alcohol and other drug use/abuse are offered to the College Community.

In addition, a campus-community alcohol and other drug coalition meets to discuss current substance abuse related issues and trends. The Academic Advising Center, Student Development (College Activities), and the Department of Public Safety participate in Choosing Healthy Options in Community Education (CHOICE). CHOICE is a coalition of SWIC students, faculty, administrators, community leaders and agency professionals who are committed to increasing awareness of alcohol, tobacco, other drugs, violence, and traffic safety problems in higher education.

SWIC’s College Activities sponsors LifeSavers as part of the CHOICE Team. LifeSavers is a peer-support, suicide and crisis-prevention program developed to train young adults to be caring listeners in their interactions with their peers. LifeSavers provides team approach to helping teenagers cope healthfully with the challenges of drugs and alcohol, peer and family relationships, sexual issues, violence, academic problems, death and grieving, aggression, anxiety, and suicide.
